Nicole threatens wind and rain moving through area

As of press time Tuesday night, Tropical Storm Nicole was moving toward Florida and forecast to become a hurricane before making landfall.

The best prediction placed the storm moving through the area beginning Wednesday night through Thursday. Tropical storm force winds and heavy rainfall are expected during the potentially prolonged event.

Union County School District announced schools would be closed Thursday and Friday. Clay schools announced closures for Thursday. Bradford was waiting until Wednesday morning decide the closure schedule.

Local authorities were urging the public

to be prepared. Bradford County Emergency Management Director Brad Witt sent out the following:

"Please ensure that you have adequate supplies on hand. While no evacuation orders are in effect for Bradford, we encourage residents to plan out ahead of time where you may evacuate to and your route to get there, if you feel that you may need to do so. Storm shelter openings will be announced via public messaging, should they become available."

Self-serve sandbag sites at the Bradford County Fire Rescue stations in Sampson City and Heilbronn Springs will remain open as long as the weather permits for those concerned about potential flooding. Sand and bags are provided, but you need to bring your own shovel.

Bradford's Citizen Information Line at the Emergency Operations Center will open for calls at 9 a.m. Wednesday morning. Please call 904-966-6300 if you have questions or need information about storm response activities. Emergency services should still be requested through the Combined Dispatch Center at 904-966-6161 or by dialing 911 for emergencies.

Tropical storm warnings are in effect across the state, as well as some hurricane watches as of press time. Bradford, Clay and Alachua were all under tropical storm warnings. Some residents were evacuated from barrier islands, low-lying areas and mobile homes in south Florida. Storm surges are expected on both coasts. Two to 3 inches or rain are predicted in the Jacksonville area.

Clinic open for primary and urgent care

STARKE — MainStreet Family Care is now open offering both primary and urgent care to patients.

The walk-in clinic opened last week at Southeast 48th Avenue and U.S. 301 across from the Walmart Supercenter. It is open seven days a week and has extended hours. They are open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The clinic treats patients one year old and older.

While walk-ins are welcome, patients may call or register online for an appointment. The goal is to see and treat patients so they are feeling better as quickly as possible. Services include urgent care, primary care, illness care and preventive care.

Primary care includes care from a physician who knows you and your medical history — one who can perform an annual physical or help you address acute and chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, asthma and diabetes.

Urgent care provides treatment for non-life-threatening injuries and illnesses. MainStreet Family Care can perform inhouse lab tests and X-rays, so you don't have to go to an emergency room. The cost is lower whether you have an insurance copayment or are paying out of pocket.

A list of common illnesses and

injuries treated includes:

General illness

- Sore and strep throat
- Cold and flu
- Abdominal pain
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhea
- Allergies and asthma
- Migraines and tension headaches
- Skin rash and poison ivy

Minor injuries

- Broken bones
- Twists and sprains
- Cuts and lacerations
- Dislocations
- Sports injuries
- Neck and back pain
- Joint pain

Infections

- Sinus infection
- Upper respiratory infection
- Bronchitis
- Ear infection

- Eye injuries and pink eye
- Minor burns and sunburn
- Ingrown toenail
- Wart and skin tag removal

There are also occupational health services available to businesses, sports physicals, vaccinations and COVID testing. As for payment, MainStreet

Family Care accepts major insurance providers, Medicaid and self-pay for the uninsured. A flat fee of \$125 can cover lab tests, X-rays, stitches and other treatments, but other services such as outside labs, vaccines, crutches and drug screening are not covered in that cost.

Insured patients with a credit or debit card can swipe their card and will be charged their copay for the visit. The insurance company is also billed, and the patient will receive an explanation of benefits explaining what costs were covered. Any uncovered amount up to \$125 will then be charged to their card.

Insured patients without a credit or debit card will receive a calculated estimate of what they owe. They will be asked to pay that amount. That payment — \$35 plus any required copay or \$125 if active coverage cannot be determined — will be applied to bill from the insurance company. In the case of overpayment, the patient's account will be credited for future visits, or the patient can request a refund.

MainStreet Family Care is open across North Carolina, Alabama and Georgia, and now north Florida. They have opened multiple locations this year alone, including Macclenny. They are also open in Quincy and Tallahassee, and soon in Live Oak and Milton.

Resource hub on track for January opening

STARKE — With a location identified and an opening date on the calendar early next year, those involved in founding a community resource hub in Bradford County have turned their attention to drawing the public in.

Iana Patterson, the human services program specialist and minority health and health equity liaison for the Bradford County Health Department, said they decided to push the opening date for the resource hub to Jan. 24 to allow more time to advertise and get the word out.

Part of that is determining how the hub will be branded. People don't necessarily know what a community resource hub is or what it can do for them, Patterson said.

In short it is a partnership of service agencies already operating in this and surrounding communities. It is a place where residents can take advantage of the many services available to

them — including many they may not know about — at single location, close to home. It is a way of leveling the playing field and achieving equity by improving access to services that can change people's lives for the better.

In addition to the health department, partners include Meridian Behavioral Health, UF/IFAS Extension Office, Civcom, Santa Fe Community College TRIO, the Hanley Foundation, Elder Options, Bradford County Coalition, CareerSource, Tobacco-Free Florida, the Center for Independent Living, the City of Starke, Bradford Schools, Healthy Families, Episcopal Children Services, Church of God by Faith and Concerned Citizens of Bradford County.

In fact, Concerned Citizens will be managing the program from the first hub location, the Bradford County Faith Community Center. The health department received startup funds for the program, but those involved will be seeking

additional grant dollars to sustain the program. As time goes on, the goal is to open additional hubs around the county, including Lawtey, Hampton and Brooker.

Their efforts are backed by a needs survey of community members requesting additional access to services, including mental health, primary medical services, food and nutrition, legal assistance, employment and education.

Until the opening in January, the task force behind the hub in collaboration with the Bradford County Coalition will be making plans and working to spread the word. Concerned Citizens will feature the project during the annual MLK Ceremony, planned for Jan. 16.

A follow-up task force meeting has been scheduled for Dec. 8 at 1 p.m. at the Bradford County Faith Community Center, 721 Old Lawtey Road in Starke. For more information, you may contact Patterson at 904-964-7723, ext. 1600.

Locals see DeSantis during two north Florida appearances

STARKE — Bradford, Union and Clay County residents saw Gov. Ron DeSantis in person as he made two campaign stops in the area during the closing stretch of his reelection campaign.

On Thursday, DeSantis spoke at Florida Gateway College in Lake City. The following day he appeared at Best Bet in Orange Park.

In the Orange Park appearance, State Representatives Bobby Payne and Sam Garrison and State Senators Jennifer Bradley and Aaron Bean warmed up the crowd at the poker facility on U.S. 17.

Garrison called the governor the most powerful, dynamic and transformative governor in the United States.

"You don't need me to tell you that," he told the crowd. "You wouldn't be standing here; you wouldn't have taken the day off work to be here if you didn't know that."



When DeSantis reached the stage, he did not mention his opponent on the Nov. 8 ballot: Crist, by name once. He did, however, rail against the policies of the U.S. President, mentioning Joe Biden seven times.

Cares about rural Florida

The Orange Park representative added that DeSantis is the same man in person as the image millions see on television.

"Ron DeSantis is our type of guy," he said. "He's a Navy veteran. He's a blue-collar guy. It's no B.S. and he gets Clay County."

Bradley, who represents Bradford, Union and Clay Counties in the Florida Senate, told the crowd that DeSantis has a track record of supporting law enforcement and has made Florida the most military-friendly state in the nation.

"I can also tell you that no governor Florida has ever had, has cared about rural Florida and our rural communities more than Governor DeSantis," she said. "He has visited all 67 counties, no matter how big, how small, from Lafayette, Dixie, Bradford, Baker, all across rural North Florida."

Bean, who is running for the District 4 U.S. House seat, which includes Clay County, said that if Republicans gain four seats in the House, they will gain a majority in the lower chamber.

Bean warned the crowd against complacency in a governor's race that some polls show DeSantis leading Democrat Charlie Crist by double digits.

"We are sitting on the four, maybe the two-yard line, ready to punch it in for the victory," he said. "If we're not careful, if we take anything for granted, then we can fumble going into the end zone. We can throw an interception on the one-yard line, and we know just like that it can be taken away, so let's not do that."

Blaming Biden

When DeSantis reached the stage, he did not mention his opponent on the Nov. 8 ballot: Crist, by name once. He did, however, rail against the policies of the U.S. President, mentioning Joe Biden seven times.

DeSantis predicted that after the Nov. 8 midterms, national media will start producing negative stories about the nation's chief executive.

"The regime media will knife this guy in the back as soon as the Democrats get blown out on Tuesday because they see him as a liability," DeSantis said.

The governor framed his own success in terms of opposing policies from Washington, like COVID-19 lockdowns and mask mandates.

DeSantis blamed Biden for inflation and the lack of domestic oil production.

He also called the recently enacted Inflation Reduction Act a farce, claiming the legislation does nothing to reduce price increases.

Martha's Vineyard

DeSantis said that because of the administration's border policy, Fentanyl overdoses are the leading cause of death among 18- to 45-year-olds; 90 terrorists have entered the U.S. through Mexico, and crime attributed to illegal immigrants has increased.

"We had a sheriff's deputy in Pinellas County, Florida, killed by a twice deported illegal alien who came across six months ago because of Biden's open border," he said.

The governor added that the national media largely ignored the border crisis until he sent 50 Venezuelans to Martha's Vineyard in September.

Where woke goes to die

DeSantis also railed against the Woke Movement, sparked by the 2020 killing of George Floyd at the hands of Minneapolis police.

"You never saw me marching in those George Floyd protests or riots, and honestly, they were attacking police with those protests," he said. "Instead of reducing (police) funding like

so many other places around the country, we did two years in a row of \$1,000 bonuses for all sworn law enforcement, all firefighters, and all EMTs in the entire State of Florida."

DeSantis also highlighted his recruitment of out-of-state law enforcement officers, offering \$5,000 bonuses as an incentive to work in the Sunshine State.

"I've spoken to a lot of these folks over the last two years, and they said it's the best decision they've ever made," DeSantis recalled. "To a man, they will say they couldn't be happier to be in a state that actually values public safety and actually values them."

DeSantis said that on a recent campaign trip to help New York gubernatorial candidate Lee Zeldin, he highlighted the differences in how Florida and New York are governed.

"We have millions more residents in the State of Florida now than in the state of New York, and yet our state budget is less than half of the state budget of New York," he claimed, "but when the New Yorkers move here, what do they tell me? 'You guys have better roads than New York, better infrastructure (and) better services.'"

DeSantis added that while Florida has the second-lowest per-capita debt in the U.S., New York has the second-highest.

He also said that with no personal state income tax and the second-lowest tax burden in the U.S., Florida has a \$22 billion budget surplus.

DeSantis also talked about his initiatives to advance parental rights in public education.

"Our education system needs to be teaching kids and educating them in the classical sense," he said, "not indoctrinating kids with ideology."

He said critical race theory, a concept now off limits to public school teachers, teaches students to hate each other and to hate America.

"Now we have teacher training programs (and) we have a civics exam that the kids take because they need to understand about the founding principles of our country," he said. "They need to understand about the Constitution and the Bill of Rights and our founding fathers. They need to understand what it means to be an American."

He added that he will continue to fight Woke activists in public policy, education and media.

"Part of being a free society is that you should be free from having these ideas forced down

your throat," he said. "Freedom from indoctrination, I think, is a core part of a free society, so we've stood up against this in our classrooms, we fought this in the businesses, we fought this in universities, and we will never ever give up or surrender to the woke mob. Florida is the place where woke goes to die."

Don't say gay

The governor said his efforts to strengthen parental rights in public education, arose in part from his and his wife's perspectives as parents of three preschool children.

"My wife and I just believe as a parent in Florida you should have the right to send your kid to school; they should be able to watch cartoons (and) do normal kid things without having some agenda shoved down their throat," he said. "It is wrong to be injecting concepts like sexuality in elementary school classrooms. It's wrong to teach a six-year-old that they were born in the wrong body. It's wrong to teach third-graders that their gender is a choice, and yet that is going on in places throughout this country."

DeSantis discussed his parental rights legislation, labeled the Don't Say Gay law by its critics. He also talked about criticism of the law, the Walt Disney Company's opposition to the measure, and the legislature's bill that stripped the entertainment giant of many of its self-governing privileges.

"They have a right to do it," he said of Disney's position on the bill, "but they don't have the right to have you and me subsidize their activism, and that's what has happened is since the 1960s."

Bullock, who served on the board for six years, told her colleagues that she began her educational career 50 years ago, teaching at Orange Park Elementary School in 1971.


"My starting salary was a mere \$6,700, but I was doing what I loved. My concern was not about the pay."

1958 as a groundman.

"One year later, he was promoted to lineman," the co-op said. "Other positions he held were utility serviceman, breaker maintenance, meter and OCR repairman, utility service equipment repairman and substation foreman."

For 27 years, until his retirement in 2007, Hagglund was a substation maintenance foreman. At the time of his retirement, he had the most years of service among any active employee with 49 years.

UC forest green and growing Worthington to pave roads with grant with assistance from FFS

LAKE BUTLER — The Florida Forest Service has recently presented the Union County Board of Commissioners with its annual report, outlining the facts and trends in silviculture in the county.

The report notes that the forest industry has contributed to a major part of the Union County economy for more than the past 100 years. It is stated that the county has 140,537 acres of land assessed as forestland, which is about 87% of the total county

landmass. Of this land, 53% is classified as industrial timber, 42% as private, non-industrial forest and 5% forestland owned by the state or county.

The Florida forest industry generates almost \$13 billion in annual sales, accounting for more than 36,000 jobs in the state. Union County accounts for about \$54 million of those annual sales, with the industry providing about 770 jobs in the county.

Noted in the report was a trend, starting in the mid-90's, that has seen a shift in the ownership of forest lands from the forest industry to private non-industrial

forest. While it is stated that this trend has slowed somewhat in recent years, it seems that the industrial operations are slowing down while the private growers are coming to the fore. The Florida Forest Service exists primarily to work with these private land owners and assist them in raising healthy trees.

One of these programs is the Forest Stewardship Program. This program focuses on multiple use management of forests. The focus is multi-pronged, looking at timber, wildlife, soil, water, recreation and aesthetics. Union County currently has 8,745 acres enrolled in this program, including 487.2 acres added in the past year. A related program is the American Tree Farm System, with 18,300 acres in certified tree farms located in the county.

FFS and the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Program (CFA) works with landowners in detecting and eradicating infestations of the southern pine beetle, with funds available to assist in this process. In the 2022 application cycle, five Union County land owners applied for \$7,193.98, to be used on 328 acres, under this program.

More than anything else, the FFS is all about conservation of resource and responsible land management. A large part of a foresters work is in the area of outreach and education. One area that is key in our area, where prolonged drought or dry conditions are common, is the issuance of burn permits and the enforcement of Florida fire prevention regulations.

In Union County, in the last fiscal year, there were 12 wildfires that burned a total of 114.61 acres of forest, grass and brush land. Of these fires, 66.67% were caused by humans and 16.67 by natural causes. FFS is responsible for enforcing the Forest Fire Laws and Open Burning Regulations of Florida. Anyone wishing to burn for land clearing, agriculture or silviculture must get a burning authorization.

New burners and others can request an on-site inspection and land-owner assistance program to make sure that they have established an adequate set-back and get other recommendations before the fire is started. Fire Prevention is one of the main focuses of FFS and they, along with members of the Union County Fire Department, give programs in the elementary school, kindergartens and daycares frequently. They are also always happy to come and speak to community groups who wish to learn more about fire safety.

WORTHINGTON SPRINGS — The Town of Worthington Springs is getting ready to begin the engineering phase of a paving project funded by a federally funded Small Cities Community Development Block Grant.

The city has had the grant, which will provide funds up to \$600,000, for two years, but has been waiting for some of the property owners to grant the town a deed of easement so that it will be legal for the city to start the project. The property in question are the roads in the Worthington Springs Trailer Park, which has been executed but not yet signed

by the town council.

The roads in question have been a topic of conversation in town since the announcement of the paving plans was made, but such use of CDBG funds is completely legal if the city is granted the deed to the property and the residents of the property fall within certain income guidelines. The roads in the trailer park were included in the project due to the condition they are in, which makes access by law enforcement, EMS and fire services difficult, according to Mayor Joan Douglas.

The town council has not yet accepted the easement because it was deemed at the Nov. 1

meeting that the project was not yet at the stage where it was necessary to do so.

Town Clerk Pat Harrell informed council members at this meeting that the engineer for the project, George F. Young, had recommended asking for an extension on the grant, as the delay in getting started had left the town only one year to complete the project.

Once the engineering phase of the project is complete the city can look at the projected cost and see if the grant funds are sufficient to accomplish the work. If this is found to be the case, the city will accept the deed of easement and work will begin.

"I am a people person who loves to be of service and will give up everything for children," Odom said. "Whatever they need I want to give it to them, or give them the help they need to achieve it."



Parrish recognized for years of care

Former Bradford County Fire Rescue Director Allen Parrish was recently recognized at the 2022 Excellence in Emergency Medical Services Awards Ceremony. According to the department, Parrish was awarded

the Larry S. Jordan EMS Hall of Fame award by the State of Florida Department of Health. The award recognizes individuals who have devoted more than 20 years of their lives enriching and enhancing the profession

of EMS as a national advocate. According to Bradford County Fire Rescue, Parrish changed the manner in which the department cares for patients throughout the entire continuum of care.

Members depart Union School Board

The Union County School Board said goodbye to two longtime members of the school district community at its Oct. 11, 2022 meeting with tears shed by some board members, administrators and members of the 45 members of the audience in attendance. The retirees were first recognized with plaques for their years of service and then, later in the meeting, the board members took the opportunity to make their own comments on the retiring individuals.

First to be recognized was Debbie McAlister, retiring from the Tiger's Den after 31 years of service as a day care worker. When presenting her with a plaque, Union County Superintendent of Schools Mike Ripplinger noted that she had helped to raise generations of students and was one of the most and best loved members in the school district and the community at large.

McAlister said she had some reservations about retiring and was sure she would miss working with the youngest of the district's students. She noted that she had been at the Tiger's Den long enough to see three generations of children in some families – first working with a child, who became a parent sending their children to her and then becoming grandparents who showed an active interest in their grandchildren.

Recognized next was 20-year School Board Member Allen Parrish. Ripplinger said of Parrish, "I have come to depend on his insight and candor, as a teacher, an administrator and as a superintendent." Union County High School Band Director Kelly Dorsey and Assistant Band Director Pam Higginbotham also presented Parrish with a commemorative award, recognizing his efforts to assist the band whenever possible. "He was the one that made it possible for me to come to Union County and work with the band and I will always be grateful to him for it," Dorsey said.

School board members each took time to talk about serving on the board with Parrish and how he had helped and inspired them, but Parrish chose to wait until the end of the meeting to make comments about his retirement.

Board Chair Curtis Clyatt said he had known Parrish since childhood, both as a fellow student and also in the FFA.

"I always admired his wit, intellect, wisdom and ability to articulate," Clyatt said. "Allen has served with great integrity and honesty and the students have benefited from it. I hope I can serve as well, and reach the level of excellence, that he has in his time on the board."

Becky Raulerson first spoke to the retirement of McAlister, saying "She had both of my children and had a great influence on them." She then turned her attention to Parrish.

To Parrish, who she had also mentioned in the invocation at the

start of the meeting, she thanked him for helping her become an effective board member.

"You helped me learn this job, with both assistance and example," Raulerson said. "You would give me those 'you can't do that eyes' and always helped me stay accountable – a talent you gave to the board. Almost every decision or vote all came back to what is best for our students and we always tried to decide on the 'Best Thing'."

Board Attorney Dan Webb said it had been a pleasure to work with Parrish.

"When he came the district was in bad shape," Webb said. "The district was bankrupt, we had a new superintendent and Allen was first elected. I admire his integrity – he always made us proud and put the students first. It has been an honor and a pleasure to work with him."

Ripplinger said that he "had always valued Allen's services to the schools and would miss him."

Board member Russell Gordon also thanked McAlister, saying that she now had one of his grandchildren in her care, then turned his attention to Parrish.

"Allen and I always worked in concert," Gordon said. He said that Parrish "truly had a servant's heart," and that he (Gordon) had leaned on him a great deal during his service and would really miss him.

Parrish began his comments by joking that he really did not have anything to say, then expressed his thanks and congratulations to McAlister. He then spoke to the students in attendance at the meeting to meet the requirements of their Civic class, explaining to them that a board member had much more to do than to "read and vote."

"We are required by law to have the meeting agenda in our hands a week before the meeting, giving us time to learn what we need to know in order to make sound decisions. A big part of our job is to learn everything about what we will be dealing with so we will know what we need to do. Now that you know this you will have something to write about for your class." In an aside to Clyatt he noted that he was "kind of looking forward to attending meetings and sitting in the audience and heckle the board and call out points of order." He also gave his congratulations to the SMACK Champions.

Parrish then gave his final comments to the board.

"I announced early, in January, that I was not going to run again but instead retire," Parrish said. "I announced early because I wanted to give anyone considering running for the seat the chance to really take the time and think if this was something they wanted to do."

"Many of you might not know this, but Union County raised me, especially the school district, so I always said that when I got older I would try to give back."

"The schools were bankrupt and the Florida Department of Education had come in and

taken over the schools. I knew that I had the ability to help and decided in 2000 to learn what this job entailed. I felt like I needed to give back, so I ran against the incumbent and won by four votes. I have always believed that every single person in this county matters and I started with that. I learned in my first term what not to do. This job has been rewarding, but in some ways it has also been a burden, always having to keep up appearances – I am looking forward to being able to go to Spires wearing flip-flops."

"Working with the administration has been a learning journey together and I am proud to have been part of this school district. I had promised myself when I first came to the board that I would stop if I ever felt that I was being ineffective and now I feel my priority should be spending more time with my family as I am getting older. I will miss it and I will miss my colleagues. This has always been a passion of mine and I always loved it."

"Union County has seen a lot of tragedy since I have been on the board – students passing, severe illness in both the staff and the students – and when the school hurt the community hurt as well, but always rallied. I have seen what community means. I worked the school bus tragedy and I saw administrators teachers and community members of no relation to the victims come to the hospital, simply because they cared. That sense of community is what makes Union County so special. I have been glad to give back 20 years."

"People should know that when they elect an official they are not only hiring that person but also their families. The same is true of administrators. My family sacrificed to allow me to serve, with the beginning of my first term requiring weekly meetings to get things straightened out. My wife worked as a teacher and my children attended the schools. They gave up vacations and weekend activities so I could learn and do this job."

"Union County is special because of the people in it and the school district is the hub of it all. The schools, the facilities, the staff, the board, the community support, the funds raised through the community, the athletics, and the academics are all second to none. But the biggest reason Union County is so special is the students. They represent us well. I am told this everywhere I go."

Parrish wiped tears a few time during his comments and once had to pause to collect his thoughts. He concluded with one comment to the board and all the others he had mentioned.

"Thank you guys for letting me ramble...I love all of you."

Parrish's District 1 seat will be assumed by the newly elected Board Member Chris Hodgson at the board's Nov. 22, 2022 regular meeting.

Putnam librarian enticed Clay teen to send sex abuse material

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS— A federal judge sentenced a former Putnam County librarian to nearly 22 years in prison for persuading a Clay County 15-year-old to send him nude photos and videos and for distributing child pornography.

Kurt Batucan Sheldon, 31, of Interlachen, was also ordered to serve a life term of supervised release and register as a sex offender.

According to a news release by the U.S. Justice Department, the case was initiated when the parents of a minor female child reported to the Clay County Sheriff's Office about sexually explicit messages being sent by an adult to their child on two different social media applications.

The adult referred to himself

as "K t" and used the username "tacticfallout." "K t" originally began communicating with the minor child on a social media application and represented himself as a male between 25-29 years of age.

"The minor child told him that she was 15 years old," the department said. "'K t' told the minor child that his name was 'Kurt' and that he lived in Putnam. The child told 'Kurt' she lived with her parents and was in school."

The department said the pair's conversation later moved to another social media platform. The defendant requested child sex abuse material—images and videos—from the 15-year-old and directed the teen on how to take the photos and pose. Approximately 50 images or

videos were sent to "K t" at his direction.

On September 4, 2020, Homeland Security Investigations agents, deputies, and detectives from the Putnam County Sheriff's Office executed a search warrant at Sheldon's residence.

"Sheldon admitted there would be child sexual abuse material on his electronic devices and that he was attracted to children," the department said. "He also admitted to asking girls he met via online applications, whom he knew to be underage, to send him nude photographs, including a 15-year-old female. Forensic examination of his devices identified more than a thousand images and several hundred videos depicting child sex abuse."

Funtastic Fire Brigade set to expand

STARKE— The owner of a 13-month-old Bradford County-based business said he is set on expanding to more markets soon.

Michael Heeder, the owner of Funtastic Fire Brigade, said some potential franchisees are looking into opening an operation in Palatka and he hopes to have a presence in Tallahassee soon.

The business provides firefighter-themed entertainment for weddings, birthday parties, and other events for children and adults. Heeder said his show includes games and activities to keep both adults and children entertained while at the same time passing along lifesaving knowledge about fire safety.

fire safety for kids," he said. "I enjoy the opportunity to get out, interact with youngsters and give them some educational information to take home with them because the Funtastic Fire Brigade is more than just firefighter-themed entertainment. It's fire safety education. It's fun with a purpose."

Heeder said that despite an uncertain outlook for the economy over the next year, he is excited about the growth prospects for his company.

"We're only 13 months old, coming up on 14 months," he said, "and we're already looking at expanding into Putnam County. We're hoping we'll be franchised in Tallahassee or somewhere in the Panhandle area by this time next year."

Heeder also said he tailors the message depending on the age of his audience.

"For little kids, we teach them not to be afraid of firefighters," he said. "So, if you see a firefighter, don't be scared. Go to them; they're here to help you."

For older children, the message changes to the dangers of playing with matches and cigarette lighters.

"The next step is talking about juvenile fire-setting behaviors and preventing kids from being too curious about fires," he said. "It's okay to be naturally curious about fire, but if you're not careful, that could extend into potential arson cases down the road."

The Funtastic fleet now includes a fire engine, a ladder truck equipped with a grill, popcorn machine, flat-screen TVs and corn hole boards, and an ambulance converted into a mobile DJ truck Heeder calls the jambulance.

The business has headlined several fall festivals and other events recently, including the Keystone Heights Boo on the Boulevard and Orange Park Hospital's open house of its stand-alone emergency department in Middleburg.

Heeder said that although the enterprise is a for-profit entity that provides entertainment, his primary mission is to teach kids about fire safety.

"I'm very passionate about

Don't play with matches

Heeder said that during festivals like the Boo on the Boulevard event, his education consists mainly of distributing fire safety literature to adults while giving candy to children.

"If we're giving away candy, we're giving away a little brochure, or we're giving away a little car that has fire safety tips on it," he said. "We tell the kids: Hey, this candy's for you, and this brochure is for mom and dad."

Heeder said the goal is to open a dialog between parents and children about fire safety and how to plan for an emergency before the emergency arises.

At private parties, the education goes beyond literature distribution and into

In it to make a difference

Heeder said his passion for fire safety education arose from a tragedy 30 years ago.

"I was responsible for actions that were not successful in saving a six-year-old child trapped in a house fire," he said. "Basically, I made a bad decision on tactics, and we couldn't get to the child in time. That has driven me for my entire fire service career."

Heeder said that after working 38 years in public safety, much of it in fire safety education, he is now using entertainment to accomplish the same goal he has worked toward his entire career.

"This has been a passion of mine," he said. "I don't want children to suffer the fate of that child so many years ago."

Heeder said that as a fire safety specialist with Gainesville Fire

Rescue, he often brainstormed with other firefighters about how to get through to youngsters and their parents about fire safety.

When he saw a program similar to the Funtastic Fire Brigade in another area, he knew he had come across a winning idea to make a lasting impression on children and their parents.

"It's a great way to get out into the community," he said.

Heeder added that the business helps pay the bills, but the mission of the Funtastic Fire Brigade is not profit-driven.

"I'm not in this to make a paycheck," he said. "I'm in it to make a difference."

Criminal Justice students receive visit from ACSO aviators

Members of the Alachua County Sheriff's Office aviation unit took a brief detour on Oct. 10, flying into neighboring Bradford County and landing its helicopter behind Bradford Middle School and North Florida Technical College for the benefit NFTC's eighth-grade Criminal Justice class.

Bradford County Sheriff's Deputy David Bukowski, who teaches the class, told students, "Basically, what I'm trying to do is just show you the different aspects of law enforcement other

just going out and chasing bad guys. There are other things that you can do once you do your time in your patrol car that you can put in for."

Representing the ACSO aviation unit were Chief Pilot Richard Bray and Lead Tactical Flight Officer Scott Caley. Bray, a former law-enforcement officer who now works for ACSO as a civilian pilot, described his and Caley's duties, saying, "The tactical flight officer is responsible for the law-enforcement mission. The pilot is responsible for getting him wherever he needs to be to do his

job safely." Caley said, "My responsibility is to work the radios, work the cameras and communicate with the pilot on where we're going or how I want him to set up an orbit to give me the best advantage for looking for whatever we're searching for."

Bray said the aviation unit's primary job is observation as part of such missions as locating missing suspects or missing persons in general. He said the unit had recently participated in a search for a missing 1-year-old and may be involved in searches for missing elderly people, such

as those with Alzheimer's.

The unit may also deploy SWAT-team members out of helicopters for tactical missions and transport K-9 officers injured in the line of duty to UF Veterinary Hospitals for treatment.

"Pretty much the only thing we don't do is clock speeders out on the highway or transport people to the hospital," Bray said.

Unit helicopters have mounted cameras that can capture images in the daytime and, through infrared technology, nighttime.

"We're able to read a license plate at 1,600 feet," Bray said. "We're able to do facial recognition from 2,000 feet. It's a very, very sophisticated, expensive camera system. There's more value in that camera than in the whole helicopter."

In discussing the camera's infrared capabilities, Bray said it can detect differences in temperature to one-tenth of a degree. It can be used to determine the type of clothing a person is wearing (whether they're wearing short or long sleeves, long pants or shorts, etc.) or if they're wearing eyeglasses.

Bray said the unit has a mapping system that it can overlay onto a video image, adding, "It has every address in the state of Florida."

As an example of why the ACSO would need addresses outside of Alachua County at its disposal, Bray said it would be helpful for ACSO personnel providing assistance in areas affected by a hurricane, where street signs and house addresses get blown away or destroyed and

than getting in a patrol car and

where houses are damaged or destroyed.

When it comes to normal day-to-day duties, the unit acts autonomously for the most part. Caley said helicopters are equipped with computer-aided dispatch systems so that aviation-unit members can monitor calls.

"I can pick and choose where we go," Caley said. "When a call comes up of interest, we'll go."

Bray answered a couple of questions asked by students, including those related to the helicopter's speed and fuel usage. He said the helicopter burns fuel at a rate of approximately 25 gallons per hour, while its maximum speed is 100 knots,

Football playoff matchups announced for BHS, UCHS

The Florida High School Association released its football playoff brackets this morning, which revealed that Bradford and Union County are the number-one seeds in their respective regions.

Bradford, which plays in Region 2 of Class 2S, will host eighth seed Crescent City (4-6) in a quarterfinal game on Friday, Nov. 11, at 7:30 p.m. Each team earned automatic berths by virtue of being district champions: Bradford in District 6 and Crescent City in District 8. The winner will play the winner between fourth seed North Marion (7-3) and fifth seed Eastside (7-2) in a semifinal game on Friday, Nov. 18.

The other matchups in the Region 2-2S are second seed Baldwin (8-2) versus seventh seed Palatka (7-3).

As the region's number-one seed, Bradford (9-1) will play at home in the semifinals and host the Region 2 championship game if it keeps winning.

Union County (6-2) earned the number-one seed and a first-round bye in Region 3 of Class 1R. The Tigers will host either fourth seed Madison County (3-6) or fifth seed Fort White (6-4) in a semifinal game on Friday, Nov. 18, at 7 p.m. Madison and Fort White play each other in a Friday, Nov. 11, quarterfinal game.

If the Tigers win, they'll host either second seed Hilliard (8-2), third seed Lafayette (8-2) or sixth seed Branford (7-3) for the Region 3 championship on Friday, Nov. 25. Lafayette

and Branford play each other in a quarterfinal game, with the winner advancing to the semifinals to play Hilliard.

Final RPI rankings

Bradford had been the number-one team in the overall Class 2S RPI rankings every week until the final rankings were released today. The Tornados are now second behind Florida High (10-0). The rest of the top 10, in descending order, consists of South Sumter (10-0), Suwannee (8-2), West Florida (7-2), Cocoa (6-3), Bishop Verot (7-2), Pensacola Catholic (9-1), Baldwin and Wakulla (7-3).

Crescent City, the Tornados' first-round playoff opponent, is ranked 44th.

Union finished fourth in the 1R rankings behind number-one Hawthorne (8-0), number-two Pahokee (8-2) and number-three Northview (10-0). The rest of the top 10, in descending order, consists of Chiefland (6-2), Chiplew (10-0), Williston (10-0), Wildwood (7-2), Sneads (10-0) and Hilliard.

Madison County is ranked 15th, while Fort White is 17th.

BHS going for 4th straight win in the playoffs' 1st round

Bradford is making its eight straight playoff appearance and is looking to win a first-round game for the fourth straight year. The Tornados have four first-round wins in the past five seasons.

This is Bradford's 23rd season in the playoffs. The Tornados

have a postseason record of 21-20.

The Tornados' opponent has experienced little postseason success. Crescent City, which is making its 17th playoff appearance, has a postseason record of 4-16. The Raiders' best showing was in 1978, when they won two games before falling one game short of reaching the Class 2A state championship game.

This is the second straight year the Raiders have qualified for the playoffs. It's their third appearance in the last five seasons.

The Raiders' four wins this year came against teams with a combined record of 12-28.

Three of the Raiders' losses came against teams that qualified for the playoffs: 47-7 against 1R Chiefland, 30-14 against 1R Hilliard and 35-15 against 2S Titusville.

Crescent City, which enters the playoffs on a three-game losing streak, is scoring an average of 26 points per game, while giving up an average of 29 points per game.

Bradford is scoring an average of 28 points per game and allowing an average of three points per game.

Six of the Tornados' wins this season came against playoff qualifiers: 21-0 against Baker County, 35-0 against Baldwin, 28-0 against Eastside, 21-7 against Munroe, 44-0 against Dunnellon and 35-14 against Palatka.

Bradford played one other playoff qualifier in Suwannee,

or approximately 90 miles per hour. The helicopter could normally travel at a speed of approximately 130 miles per hour if not for the camera mounted on its front, Bray said.

The minimum requirements for pilots in the ACSO aviation unit are to have a commercial-pilot rating and an instrument rating, Bray said, adding that ACSO doesn't provide check rides, which are the examinations for those ratings.

"We want to see a little bit of investment from the person in their career," Bray said.

Bray went through flight training in the early 1980s simply because he was interested in learning how to fly helicopters.

"Because I already had my rating, I got hired right into an

aviation unit after about seven years of patrol with another agency down south," he said. "I've been flying full-time ever since."

Caley, who's been with ACSO since 2000, worked "the road" for nine years before applying for the aviation unit. He did part-time work in aviation at first while still working full-time in road patrol. Caley has been working full-time in aviation since 2017.

The Criminal Justice students basically experienced an out-of-the-ordinary show-and-tell, which culminated with them pulling out their phones and capturing the moment as Bray and Caley flew away.

Bukowski teaches a total of six Criminal Justice classes, with the other five consisting of high school students.

Union County High School's best season since finishing as state runner-up in 2017 came to an end in the Class 1A semifinals on Nov. 11 as the Tigers traveled to Okaloosa County and lost 3-0 (25-17, 25-19, 25-19) to the Baker Gators.

The second seed Gators (22-6) will play number-one seed Liberty County (27-2) for the state championship on Friday, Nov. 11. Liberty advanced by beating fourth seed Williston

(19-11) 3-1 (20-25, 25-15, 25-12, 25-14).

Union, the third seed in the Final Four, got 12 kills and 16 digs from Jaycee Davis. Journey Crim had 13 digs, while Jordan Hendricks, Bella Johns and Kamryn Southerland each had eight.

Hendricks and Southerland each had nine assists, while Rylie Parrish had two blocks.

The Tigers (20-8) advanced to the state semifinals by defeating host Aucilla Christian 3-0 (25-18, 25-17, 25-22) for the Region 3 championship on Nov. 1. The Telegraph-Times-Monitor reported that result in the Nov. 3 issue, but stats weren't available by deadline. In that match, Davis had 16 kills and 16 digs. Crim and Johns had 14 and 10

digs, respectively, while Jaily Simmons had nine.

Hendricks and Southerland recorded 15 and 13 assists, respectively. Each also had six digs.

This was the first year the Tigers won at least one playoff match since 2017. Union also set the school record for most wins in a season, surpassing the 2011 and 2015 teams, which each finished with 19 wins.







Tornadoes come up short of perfect season, lose 10-7 to 'Dogs

Bradford High School turned the ball over twice and couldn't capitalize on three trips inside the opponent's 25-yard line as host Suwannee handed the Tornadoes their first loss of the season by a score of 10-7 on Nov. 4 in Live Oak.

It was a matchup of top-10 teams in the Class 2S power rankings. At the time, Bradford was ranked number one, while Suwannee was eighth.

The Tornadoes (9-1) and the Bulldogs (8-2) were ranked second and fourth, respectively, in the final rankings, which were released Nov. 6.

"This was a playoff-caliber game," Bradford Head Coach Jamie Rodgers said. "This is what it's going to be like in the playoffs, so I think it was really good for us."

Bradford, which will host a Region 2 quarterfinal playoff game against Crescent City on Friday, Nov. 11 (see related story on page 11), was attempting to go undefeated in the regular season for the first time since 1990.

"We played against a really good team," Rodgers said. "They gave us everything they had and then some. They deserved to win."

The Tornadoes' first two offensive series began at their own 20, while their third drive began at their own 10.

Bradford never had a short field to work with as six of its eight possessions began inside its own 25.

"We were behind the eight-ball field position-wise all night," Rodgers said. "They did a good job on special teams in getting us in bad field position."

Still, Bradford held a large advantage in total yardage, with 326 to Suwannee's 147.

Rodgers said his team didn't perform the way it needed to against a Suwannee team that had won five straight, with three of those wins coming against teams that qualified for the playoffs.

"When you run into somebody like that, you're going to lose if you don't play a good game," Rodgers said. "We didn't play very well tonight."

Suwannee's first drive began at the Bradford 40 after a 22-yard punt. On the first play, quarterback Bronsen Tillotson connected with Michael Rossin on a 33-yard pass play that put the Bulldogs at the 7-yard line. Bradford's Chason Clark and Jametrius Pringle tackled Marquavious Owens for no gain on the next play. After two incomplete passes, Suwannee's Braxtyn Green kicked a 24-yard field goal to put the Bulldogs up 3-0 at the 8:30 mark of the first quarter.

The Tornadoes, after going three-and-out and losing 2 yards on their initial series, put together a promising drive. Willie Pollard picked up first downs on runs of 13 and 18 yards as Bradford moved from its 20-yard line to

the Suwannee 49. Pollard would later pick up another first down, while quarterback Jeremiah McKenzie had two runs that resulted in first downs on a drive that consisted of nothing but runs by the two players.

McKenzie's 4-yard run gave the Tornadoes a first down at the 13. Suwannee then held Pollard to no gain, while a holding penalty backed Bradford up to the 26-yard line. A sack and a fumble put an end to the drive.

The Bulldogs threatened to increase their lead after intercepting a tipped pass. A 17-yard run by Owens moved Suwannee from its own 49 to the Bradford 34. One play later, on second-and-5, the Tornadoes' Jarrin Alexander tackled Owens for a 2-yard loss. Pringle broke up a pass on third down, forcing the Bulldogs to attempt a 48-yard field goal, which was no good with 2:06 remaining in the first half.

After the ensuing kickoff, the Tornadoes picked up a first down on a 6-yard run Pollard and a 5-yard facemask penalty. McKenzie picked up another first down on an 11-yard run, while a personal-foul facemask penalty gave Bradford a first down at the Suwannee 41.

A 6-yard run by McKenzie and an 8-yard reception by Pringle helped the Tornadoes pick up another first down, but Bradford eventually faced a fourth-and-6 at the 26. With no time outs and the clock running, Bradford was able to get its field-goal personnel on the field in time for Hayden Hughes to attempt a kick, but the 43-yarder was no good as time expired.

Suwannee began the second half with a 17-yard kickoff return, putting the Bulldogs at their own 42. Owens carried the ball for a 33-yard gain to the Bradford 25. After an illegal-procedure penalty, Owens had runs of 15 and 12-yards, setting up first-and-goal at the 3.

The five-play drive was nothing but carries by Owens, who scored on a run from the 1-yard line approximately two minutes into the third quarter. Green added the PAT for a 10-0 Suwannee lead.

Owens finished with 93 yards rushing on 14 carries.

A penalty on the ensuing kickoff had Bradford's offense starting a drive at its own 6. The Tornadoes gained 35 yards on the first eight plays on runs by McKenzie and Pollard. Brandon Williams had consecutive runs of 9 and 3 yards to give Bradford a first down at the Suwannee 47. A 14-yard run by Pollard, with an additional 15 yards tacked on for a personal foul, moved the Tornadoes to the 18. Pollard, who finished with 143 yards on 32 carries, then broke free for a 17-yard run, which set up McKenzie for a 1-yard touchdown run with 3:53 to play in the third quarter. Hughes added the PAT, making the score 10-7.

Suwannee moved into Bradford territory on the following possession, with a 20-yard pass play resulting in a first down at the 30. The Bulldogs were forced to settle for a 43-yard field-goal attempt, which was blocked by Clark.

McKenzie, who rushed for 95 yards on 20 carries, had a 22-yard run to give the Tornadoes

a first down at the Suwannee 30. Two runs by Pollard and a run by McKenzie failed to give Bradford another first down. On fourth-and-two, the Tornadoes were penalized for illegal procedure. The resulting fourth-and-7 play had the Bulldogs holding McKenzie to a 3-yard gain and forcing a turnover on downs.

The Tornadoes would threaten to score one last time, thanks to a 49-yard pass play from McKenzie to Pollard that put Bradford at the Suwannee 25-yard line. The Bulldogs' defense held Brian Clifflin to no gain on the next play. After a 3-yard run by Pollard on second down, McKenzie was held to no gain, forcing the Tornadoes into a fourth-and-7 play with 2:08 left in the game. McKenzie's pass to Pringle in the back of the end zone was incomplete.

Rodgers said he believed it was good for his team to face some adversity this season — a season in which Bradford's average margin of victory was 28 points.

Now that the playoffs are here, how will Bradford handle future adversity?

"Either they'll rise to the challenge, or they won't," Rodgers said. "That's the way it is."

Tigers close regular season with 31-15 win over 2S Braves

"It's an opportunity that we will never get again," Diston said. "I knew I had to give it my all."

Union (6-2) now prepares for the Class 1R playoffs. The Tigers have a first-round bye and will host either Fort White or Madison County on Friday, Nov. 18 (see related story on page 11).

Cortese had a touchdown run and a touchdown pass to Diston to put the Tigers up 14-0 in the first quarter. Dee Williams caught a 54-yard touchdown pass from Cortese to make it 21-3 in the second quarter.

Jonathan Edwards, who was 4 of 4 on extra-point attempts, kicked a 25-yard field goal in the third quarter to put Union ahead 24-15.

Durant ended the scoring with a touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

The Tigers had 220 rushing

yards and 321 receiving yards for a combined 541 yards.

Cortese, who had his highest passing yardage total this season, had a passing rate of 68 percent as he completed 13 of 19 attempts. He also carried the ball seven times for 59 yards.

Diston had quite the night, with eight receptions for 195 yards. The Tigers' leader in receiving yards per game had many unbelievable catches during this matchup against the 7-3 Braves and finished with 207 total yards receiving and rushing.

Williams finished with the one catch that was good for a second-quarter touchdown, while Gavin Jenkins caught three passes for 44 yards.

Durant, who leads the team in rushing yards per game, played a little less during this game due to his shoulder restraints. Despite that, he still performed as his usual self each time he was handed the ball. Durant had one touchdown for the Tigers and ran for 102 yards on 14 carries, averaging in about 7 yards each play.

The senior running back said the offensive line opened a lot of gaps for him to make long runs.

The Blue Wave then closed out their scoring for the night on a four-play, 35-yard drive, highlighted by a 22-yard pass from Curtis to Deldrick Goston. P.K. Yonge held a 35-14 lead with 7:04 remaining in the third quarter.

The Blue Wave threatened once more in the fourth quarter, driving to the Indian 20. Keystone's Sam Ulsch terminated the threat, intercepting a pass on the Keystone 2-yard line.

Ulsch's heroics energized the Indians, who marched the length of the field in eight plays, highlighted by a Baylor Ford pass to Carson Eatmon, who lateraled to Daniels for a 31-yard gain. Daniels then added a 23-yard scoring run, and Keystone closed the Blue Wave's lead to 35-22 with 5:04 left in the game.

Keystone Heights Head Coach Chuck Dickinson said his team couldn't keep pace with the Blue Wave's high-powered offense. He noted that the visitors scored on five out of seven possessions.

"We scored on three out of six, I think, so we just didn't keep up the scoring with them," Dickinson said.

Daniels racked up 221 yards and a touchdown on 31 carries, while backfield companion Schenck ran for 57 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries.

Tyler Anthony-Rozier led Keystone in tackles with eight, followed by Andrew Lowery III and Damien Dunlap with five each. Schenck and Kyle Perkins each had three defensive stops.

Dickinson added that the team worked hard throughout the game and didn't give up.

As for the 2-8 campaign, the coach said he lost a lot of players from last year's squad and that the current crop of freshmen

"Hopefully, that'll be some experience we can build on next year," he said.

which defeated the Tornados 10-7 in the teams' regular season finale (see story on page 17).

UCHS qualifies for 6th straight season

This marks Union County's sixth straight year in the playoffs and their 25th year overall. The Tigers have a 37-21 postseason record after going 2-1 in 2021. That was the third straight year Union went 2-1 in the postseason.

The Tigers have to wait a week to get their postseason started, thanks to earning a bye. In looking at their possible opponents on Nov. 18, the one that stands out, despite its 3-6 record, is Madison County, which won the Class 1A state championship the last four years.

Madison has an overall playoff record of 66-19. The Cowboys are in the playoffs for the ninth straight year and have qualified

every year but one since their first appearance in 1995.

Besides the four state championships they won from 2018 through 2021, the Cowboys also won Class 2A titles in 2001 and 2007. Madison has also been state runner-up five times (twice in 2A, twice in 3A and once in 4A).

As usual, the Cowboys played a strong schedule in 2022, which consisted of six teams that qualified for the playoffs. Madison beat two of those teams — 40-33 against 1M Carrollwood Day and 28-21 against 3S Rickards — while it lost to 3S Columbia 21-0, 2S Florida High 21-6, 2S Suwannee 36-7 and Georgia's Fitzgerald 20-12.

Madison is scoring an average of 19 points per game, while allowing an average of 25 points per game. Fort White — Union's other possible opponent — qualified for the playoffs for the 15th year. The Indians have a postseason record of 5-13 and have never advanced beyond the second round.

One of the Indians' wins this season did come against 1R playoff qualifier Lafayette by a score of 23-21, but their five other wins came against teams with a combined record of 7-41.

Three of Fort White's losses came against 1R playoff qualifiers: 34-17 against Newberry, 56-28 loss against Williston and 41-14 against Chiefland.

The Indians are scoring an average of 28 points per game, while allowing an average of 23 points per game.

Four of Union's wins this season came against playoff qualifiers: 31-27 against 3S Columbia, 55-7 against 1S P.K. Yonge, 45-0 against 1R Newberry and 31-15 against 2S Walton.

The Tigers played two other playoff qualifiers, losing 33-14 to 1M University Christian and losing 28-21 against 1R Hawthorne.
