

Effort underway to name highway after Gianas

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — Clay County Commissioners agreed to adopt a resolution that would endorse an effort to designate State Road 230 within Clay County in honor of the late Dr. Peter Gianas.

Commissioner Betsy Condon said she has spoken with Bradford County Commissioner Chris Dougherty about also designating the section of 230 within Bradford after the physician. Gianas served as the medical director for Alachua County Fire Rescue, Bradford County Fire Rescue, Clay County Fire Rescue, Union County Emergency Medical Services, Gilchrist County Fire Rescue, Starke Fire Rescue, San-

ta Fe College emergency medical services training programs and Florida Gateway College emergency medical service training programs.

Condon said the Bradford commissioner will seek a resolution from his colleagues.

before approving the designations.

Condon added that State Rep. Chuck Brannan has agreed to sponsor a bill in the Florida House to designate the highway in honor of Gianas.

"You can't be around people from Kingsley Lake, Bradford County, Clay County Fire Rescue ... that don't have a memory of Dr. Pete," Condon said. He's clearly an icon, and I know you all miss him every day."

Clay Commission delays impact fee vote

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — During their Oct. 25 meeting, Clay County commissioners delayed for 30 days a vote on the implementation of new impact fees that would add to the cost of new construction within the county and would fund infrastructure improvements.

An impact fee study completed for commissioners states the county could charge a maximum impact fee of \$6,577 for a newly built home between 1,500 and 2,499 square feet.

Several representatives of the development and construction industries asked commissioners to delay taking action on the proposed fees.

T.R. Hainline Jr. of the Rogers Towers law firm told commissioners that if they implemented the impact fees, the county would be obligated to spend \$334 million on infrastructure improvements, and the impact fees would only cover \$153 million, leaving the county obligated to come

up with the remaining \$181 million from other sources.

"If the county does not expend those funds," Hainline said, representing the Northeast Florida Builders Association, "if it falls behind or just decides it's going to do something else, that means that the standards haven't been met, the fees have no basis. And what can people do who have paid fees? They can come in and ask for a refund."

Susan Frazier, representing the Reinhold Corporation and Northeast Florida Builders, questioned some of the assumptions in the impact fee study.

"I think the approach is right, and the methodology's right, but the details of the numbers have not really gotten a shakeout," she told commissioners.

Austin Nicklas, the director of government affairs with the Northeast Florida Builders Association, told commissioners the impact fees would negatively impact Clay County's

UC commissioners evaluate special assessment income

LAKE BUTLER — Union County Property Appraiser Bruce Dukes has completed his annual estimate of the funds to be expected by the county from the special assessments included in their ad valorem taxes. These assessments pay or help pay the cost of the county's use of the Tri-County Landfill and also the cost of operating Emergency Medical/Rescue Services.

Garbage assessments are based on projected volume of solid waste from various types of housing, and range from \$70 (for single family, mobile home and multi-family housing). Businesses pay more, again based on the type of business and the volume they produce. There are four classes of business in the schedule, paying from \$65-130. The assessment for EMS is the same for all property owners, at \$70 per year. It should be noted that these assessments do not pay the full amount needed to operate these services, which are two

of the most expensive the county must provide to its residents.

Single family housing owners, of which there are 2017 in the county, pay \$70 for garbage and another \$70 for rescue. The owners of the county's 2197 mobile homes pay the same, as do multifamily residence owners (per family/unit), of which there are 111 in the county.

Commercial 1 property owners, the smallest class as to size and volume of garbage, pay \$65 for garbage and \$70 for rescue. Commercial 2 business are larger and make up the largest class of businesses in the county for tax purposes. Commercial 2 property owners pay \$85 for garbage and \$70 for rescue. The 43 still larger Commercial 3 businesses pay \$110 for garbage and \$70 for rescue and the largest class of business, the eight Commercial 4 property owners pay \$130 for garbage and \$70 for rescue.

The total amount expected/estimated by Dukes for all county

properties is \$316,040 for garbage and \$43,740 for rescue. The total for both special assessments is estimated to be \$630,750.

The garbage assessment helps pay for the operation of the collection sites, the transport of the material from these sites and the cost of putting this garbage into the landfill, called tipping fees. This money does not pay the total cost associated with these services, however, as there is the operation of the county Solid Waste Department, which

includes dumpsters, vehicles and the salaries of personnel, as well as other costs, which come from other income sources besides the assessment, including funds from ad valorem taxes and grant funds as available, mostly earmarked for special programs such as the annual tire amnesty event.

The EMS/Rescue assessment covers even less of the total cost of operation than the garbage assessment does of total costs. Rescue costs include vehicles, staff, staff training, vehicle maintenance, equipment (purchase and maintenance), uniforms and special gear for specific events (such as for working with possible COVID patients), medication, supplies

and the general cost of running this type of department. EMS/Rescue is the single most expensive department the county runs and it is also one of the most necessary. As with solid waste, there are sometimes monies available from special grants and state and Federal programs, but the county has to budget for the rest of the costs of operation.

The Union County Board of Commissioners know the citizens of the county need and want these services and is committed to providing them, and have stated this in many of their meetings, but in recent years finding the funds has been a difficult proposition. Although EMS/Rescue helps pay for itself through the billing of patients and their insurance (if they have any) and agreements for patient transport with other entities like the prisons, uninsured patients without insurance sometimes do not pay their transport costs.

There are also other considerations with providing outside services, as these require an additional unit to be available most times so as to ensure that enough fully staffed units are available to meet the needs of county residents. The commission, as well as EMS Director Toby Witt, are working to find ways to fund the department without the cost affecting other county services.

'Thank you, Starke' Shipment reaches Ukraine

A shipment of protective gear is finally in Kyiv, reported businessman and former Bradford County resident Dwight Hewett this week.

Hewett, who has a strong relationship with the culture and country of Ukraine and is involved with the Ukraine Congress Committee of America,

helped organize donations of thousands of ballistic vests from the Miami-Dade Police Department and smaller agencies, including the Starke Police Department. In addition to life-saving bullet-proof vests, Hewett visited communities and collected helmets, gas masks and other equipment.

Hewett was in Starke June 10. He said customs delays in

Germany and Poland, as well as long lines into Ukrainian territory, delayed the shipment. The two 40-foot container have arrived in Kyiv, however, where leaders, soldiers and civilians continue to defend their country from Russia.

Hewett once again expressed his gratitude for the city's donations.

CareerSource staff eager for location

STARKE — CareerSource North Central Florida CEO Phyllis Marty says a local Starke office should be open by year's end.

Questions about the status of the local office were raised by a letter from a CareerSource employee who was concerned about the inability to serve local residents.

Alachua County took over the Alachua-Bradford workforce organization in July 2021 following the ouster of a third-party management firm over the misappropriation of funds. According to the letter, CEO Marty and Operations Director Anna Mendoza learned shortly thereafter that lease of the Bradford office on Call Street would not be renewed over ADA compliance issues.

In spite of the advance notice, local CareerSource staff have been without a base to meet with residents since June, with the exception of some office hours worked at the Bradford County Public Library.

The employee who wrote the letter stated that problems arose with the library shortly after they began working there. The implication was that the library had not been adequately compensated, according to the letter.

Bradford Library Director Robert Perone denied that any compensation was ever expected in exchange for the use of the library's study room meeting

space. No one is charged for use of the library's meeting spaces. Availability is based on who signs up, and CareerSource did utilize a study room, but then stopped showing up.

Assistant Library Director Cyndy Weeks said CareerSource would reserve a room for a few hours two or three days a week, and that lasted two to three weeks. CareerSource clients would come to the library after that, but there was no one for them to meet with, she said. For several weeks, people were waiting, and the library tried to reach out to their contact, with no success. Weeks said library staff had to turn people away.

"Regarding the library being paid to use any room, no, we don't do that. Our services are free," Perone said.

"They are more than welcome to use it within our guidelines," he said. "We would welcome

them having a place to come in."

Marty said CareerSource has been working with Bradford County on leasing space in the courthouse annex, which houses community development and other services. County attorney Will Sexton was negotiating that lease with CareerSource, but is no longer with the county.

Bradford County Manager Scott Kornegay confirmed there is a space awaiting them, but the absence of an attorney to represent the county in the negotiation is the roadblock. The timeline depends on how quickly he can get an attorney on board, he said.

While the office needs some buildout to accommodate CareerSource, Marty said she was hopeful it will be open by the end of the year.

The sooner the better for local CareerSource staff and clients. As the letter writer points out,

Cammack presents Purple Heart, additional honors to Korean War veteran

Congresswoman Kat Cammack presented James Lewis Wilkerson of Lawtey with recovered medals earned during his service in the Korean War.

Wilkerson received the Purple Heart, the National Defense Service Medal, the Korean Service Medal with four bronze stars, the combat infantryman badge, and the United Nations Service Medal. He also received a flag flown over the U.S. Capitol in honor of his service and sacrifice while surrounded by his friends and family in a formal ceremony.

Wilkerson, now 93 years old, enlisted in the U.S. Army on January 11, 1951. After basic training, he deployed to Korea where he was wounded in action on August 6, 1951. He was released from active duty in 1953 after recovering from injuries he sustained in Korea.

The Purple Heart is a distinct honor presented to U.S. service members who have been wounded or killed as a result of enemy action while serving in the U.S. Military.

"It's an honor and a privilege to present Mr. Wilkerson with the medals he earned during his distinguished service in the Forgotten War in Korea," said Rep. Cammack. "He earned each and every one of his distinctions and I'm so proud that our office could help him and his family recover his service medals after

all these years. Our team works hard on behalf of our heroes and I'm grateful for their work to make this long overdue ceremony possible."





Halloween festivities held on two nights in Union County



UCHS Band has busy schedule

The Union County High School Band is right in the middle of its busiest time of year.

The band is making a return to full strength after the COVID pandemic sidelined most of the bands seniors – with only three woodwind and percussion players finishing the year. According to Band Director Kelly Dorsey, 83% of last year's band was made up of freshman and sophomore players, and these young musicians were working at a great disadvantage during the period of time classes were being held online, with little one-on-one help from older members and Dorsey.

"We got hit by the lack of instruction, just like the academic subjects and it hurt," Dorsey (who contracted COVID herself). "This is a 'roll up your sleeves and work' sort of year, playing catch-up on what was missed. The band is much stronger now and these kids have worked so hard, when I think about where we started this year compared to where we are now it makes me extra proud of what they have accomplished."

Dorsey said that the musicians have needed a great deal of one-on-one work, as well as

individual and small group instruction, to bring them up to the performance level the band is known for.

The band has made it through its first trials of the year, with football games and homecoming parade performances, all the while preparing for the District Performance Assessment, held Saturday, Oct. 29, 2022. Dorsey was quick to point out that this event is an assessment and not a competition, designed to encourage marching band members to achieve a certain standard in their performance, both musically and in their presentation. Marching band members will execute a 5-10 minute performance under the scrutiny of six judges – two for music, one for marching, one for percussion, one auxiliary judge (who looks at a little of everything) and one who judges their overall performance. The UCHS Marching Band has a history of earning a superior rating (the highest possible) in this event for the past several years and Dorsey said she hoped to continue the trend with the current group.

One interesting item about the music to be played this year is that the patriotic mix the band will be playing was written especially for the UCHS Band for this very

event. The music is an original arrangement done by Robert Thurston, of Virginia. Thurston is the resident composer/arranger for the United State Air Force Band. He is also an old friend of Dorsey's from college.

It seems that the UCHS band is always getting ready for something when they are already doing something else. While getting ready for the Performance Assessment they were also preparing for the annual visit from the students from Lake Butler Elementary School. On Nov. 3, 2022 the students from LBES will come to the high school for a musical event where they will be shown the variety of instruments used in the band, get to touch and hold them and then be given their own private concert. First, each section of the band will play separately, letting the kids hear the sort of sounds made by the types of instruments, then the band will play a few songs that the youngsters will know for a sing-a-long. Finally, the band will perform the music they played at the recent assessment to let the little ones experience a full marching performance.

The following week, on Nov. 11 the band will perform at the school's Veterans Day event with a program of all new

music, but by that time they will already be looking ahead at their Christmas performances. They will start the holiday season with a performance in the Lake Butler Christmas Parade on Dec. 3, 2022. Hot on the heels of this appearance, the Jazz Band will perform for the Lake Butler Rotary Club at its Dec. 6, 2022 meeting. After enough time to take a good deep breath, the band will present its annual Christmas Concert, in the UCHS Auditorium at 7 p.m. on Dec. 13, 2022. The concert is a free event, with everyone welcome. Donations will be accepted at the door if anyone is so inclined. After this event the band will take a break to enjoy the holidays with their families, but all will know that spring is looming, with the annual assessment for both the concert band and individual musicians – both of which require intensive preparation and practice. Dorsey said she knows they will all be ready.

"I have a lot of terrific kids in the band this year," Dorsey said. "They all work extra hard and have really big hearts. They also love to work together and are very supportive of each other. I am proud of them all and know they will do their best and make Union County proud of them as well."

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS— During its Oct. 24 meeting, the city council gave a key to the city to the founder of Mission of the Dirt Road, a Wesleyan Missional Community serving the residents of High Ridge Estates.

The presentation by Mayor Karen Lake to Carey Morford is one in a series of the council's efforts to recognize people of impact in Keystone Heights.

Previous recipients of the recognition were Seeds of Grace co-founder Terri Sapp, Lake Area Ministries and Johnny Mason, owner of Johnny's Barbecue.

Lake said Morford's vision for Mission of the Dirt Road began in 2014 and became a reality with the establishment of the Seeds of Grace Community Garden in 2016.

"Residents of High Ridge

began establishing their own traditions like the annual Pumpkin Party, Thanksgiving Feast and Christmas Party," Lake said, reading from a proclamation. "In 2019, Mission of the Dirt Road was ready to purchase a building and expand their ability to offer ministry and services to the community."

Lake added that the vision for the mission is that residents of High Ridge Estates would become neighbors and friends who devote themselves to the teachings of Jesus Christ and fellowship with each other.

Morford told council members she hopes the county will approve an improvement project for the High Ridge neighborhood next year, similar to the College Drive Initiative launched in 2020 in the Middleburg-Orange Park area.

The College Drive Initiative seeks to leverage nonprofit

organizations on the nearly three-mile roadway from Blanding Boulevard to County Road 220.

The drive is home to St. Johns River State College, the Thrasher-Horne Center, Mercy Support Services and others.

Even though College Drive and High Ridge Estates have differing strengths and challenges, becoming a county-designated project would help the area with planning and resources.

"Mission of the Dirt Road has been a dream that's come to fruition," Morford told council members. "One of the things we're most excited about is this High Ridge Initiative, where we're starting to see some momentum grow in our county, to really look at some big improvements in the neighborhood with county cooperation."

Melrose killer receives death sentence

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS— A Putnam County jury deliberated for less than an hour on Friday, Oct. 28, before recommending the death penalty for Mark Wilson Jr.

The same jury earlier convicted the 33-year-old for the bludgeoning and stabbing deaths of 14-year-old Tayten Baker and 12-year-old Robert Baker on Aug. 26, 2020.

Seventh Judicial Circuit State Attorney R.J. Larizza said in a news conference shortly after the 2020 murders on Shiloh Road, east of Melrose, that he was shocked by the viciousness of the crimes.

"I've been in the criminal justice system working since 1980," he said, "and these are some of the most brutal murders I've ever heard about. I can tell you the defendant, he attacked these kids without mercy."

"When you have a murder with the level of violence that we had in these particular cases," he added, "it's disturbing not just to law enforcement and prosecutors but the community as a whole."

The defendant's mother, Chryis Adkins, played a key role in her son's conviction, first

coaxing a confession from him and then reporting the admission to Putnam deputies. She later agreed to talk to Wilson about the murders while detectives recorded the conversation.

During Wilson's trial, Adkins told jurors how her son confessed to the killings.

However, during the sentencing phase, Adkins testified on her son's behalf, telling the jury about the defendant's abusive father.

Adkins said Mark. Wilson Sr. went into fits of rage beginning with she was eight months pregnant with the defendant.

She added that the father spat on her, poured beer on her and threatened her life.

She also said she never saw Mark Wilson Sr. abuse their son.

A pediatric neurologist testified that scans of the defendant's brain showed abnormalities in the areas of the brain associated with impulse control, stress and memory.

The defendant's 22-year-old sister also testified. Kayla Woodard told jurors that her brother supported her throughout her school years and encouraged her to complete high school.

Assistant Public Defender Rosemarie Peoples asked Woodard if she loved her brother. "Very much so," the defendant's sister replied.

Assistant State Attorney Jennifer Dunton reminded jurors of the brutality of the murders, telling them that the older boy left a trail of blood as he tried to crawl away from the attack.

Dunton said Tayten Baker was alive for at least 30 seconds after Wilson began stabbing him, and she said cuts on the teen's hands showed he tried to defend himself before Wilson hit him in the head with a hammer.

Circuit Judge Howard McGillin will sentence Wilson at a future date. The defendant's next hearing is scheduled for Dec. 1.

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Tornadoes win District 6-2S title

In the week leading up to the game that would decide the District 6-2S championship, Bradford High School running back Willie Pollard said he kept telling himself, "I've got to have a big game."

He did indeed have a big game, rushing for 234 yards and three touchdowns on 31 carries as the number-one ranked Tornadoes defeated 19th-ranked Palatka 35-14 on Oct. 28 in Palatka.

It was Bradford's first district championship since 2016.

"They deserve it," Head Coach Jamie Rodgers said. "They've put a lot of hard work into this. I'm really happy for them."

Pollard said, "It's amazing. We've been working hard. We've been fighting for it since day one — pretty much the summer. We've been fighting for it every day. One game at a time, we've been working."

This was the first season since 2016 that the Tornadoes (9-0, 3-0) even had the opportunity to play for a title. The Florida High School Athletic Association eliminated districts in the smaller classifications from 2017 through 2021.

Now, seniors like linebacker Bryson Bowen have a memory they'll cherish the rest of their lives.

"It's crazy. It's just unreal," Bowen said. "It's a journey — my senior year. It's like we're playing perfect this season. We're all just coming together as one. It's just amazing to be 9-0. It's an amazing feeling."

The Tornadoes, who travel to play 17th-ranked Class 2S Suwannee (7-3) in the regular-season finale on Friday, Nov. 4, at 7:30 p.m., earned an automatic bid to the Region 2 playoffs as the district champ.

Bradford opened the game with an eight-play, 80-yard scoring drive. Chalil Cummings caught three passes from Jeremiah McKenzie for 56 yards. Cummings' 12-yard reception set up a 5-yard touchdown run by Pollard, who had four carries on the drive for 23 yards. Hayden

Hughes added the PAT to make the score 7-0 at the 8:12 mark of the first quarter.

Bradford drove from its 35 to the Palatka 2 on its second possession, getting runs of 16 and 22 yards from Pollard. A personal-foul penalty ultimately forced the Tornadoes to attempt a 34-yard field goal, which was no good with 2:28 remaining in the first quarter.

A 12-yard run by Gavin Cook had the Tornadoes beginning their third possession on the Palatka 45. Pollard ripped off a 16-yard gain on the first play, followed by a 14-yard run by Brandon Williams. On third-and-10 from the 15, McKenzie threw a touchdown pass to Chason Clark at the 9:20 mark of the second quarter. Hughes kicked the extra point for a 14-0 lead.

McKenzie finished 5 of 8 passing for 73 yards.

Torin Brazell and Chason Clark each recorded a sack on the ensuing Palatka possession, which forced the Panthers (7-2, 2-1) into a third-and-20 play and an eventual punt.

The Tornadoes' offense put together a six-play, 42-yard scoring drive. Pollard

and McKenzie each a run that resulted in a first down, with Pollard capping the drive with a 15-yard touchdown run with 4:43 left in the first half. After Hughes' PAT, the score stood at 21-0.

Bradford's defense entered the game having given up seven points all year, recording shut outs in seven of eight games. The Tornadoes allowed no points in 16 straight quarters until the Panthers put a touchdown on the board with 2:54 until halftime. Palatka had to drive only 35 yards, thanks to a 56-yard kickoff return by Cartaveon Valentine.

Still, Palatka's offense managed only 11 yards on the drive, with pass-interference, personal-foul and unsportsmanlike-conduct penalties accounting helping set up the Panthers' Ty'ran Buch for a 3-yard touchdown run. Joseph Alvarez kicked the extra point to make the score 21-7.

When the first half ended, Palatka had only 22 yards of offense. The Panthers, who added their second score with 37 seconds left in the game, gained a total of 144 yards.

"Tonight, we gave up two touchdowns," Bowen said. "That's what really motivates

us to do better. After we gave up the (first) touchdown, we played harder."

Bradford's defense was missing multiple starters, including linemen Dejon McBride and Tray Schmitt. Rodgers said Cummings, who plays defensive back as well as wide receiver, wasn't 100 percent, as he was playing with a hip injury.

"We had some kids dig really deep and play hard," Rodgers said, adding that the Tornadoes got "unbelievable" performances from Brazell (defensive lineman) and Clark (linebacker), both of whom started on both sides of the ball.

The Tornadoes created two turnovers on defense — the first of which was an interception by C.J. Carn before halftime. Trente Jenkins recovered a fumble in the third quarter.

Turnovers were an issue for the Bradford offense in the second half. The Tornadoes fumbled the ball away three times and had a fourth lost fumble on a kickoff return. Still, the Tornadoes found the end zone twice, building a 28-point lead.

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


Harry Hileman

Ronaldo Medina adding the extra point.

With under a minute remaining in the half, Dean broke an 83-yard scoring run, opening up a 14-point lead for the Toros at the half with Medina's PAT.

The Indians tried an onside kick to start the second half, but Toco Creek recovered the ball on its own 47. Killmer then led the Toros on a 53-yard scoring drive, capped with a Ziovanii Axaopoulos 1-yard run. Medina's extra point gave the Toros a 21-0 lead with 10 minutes remaining in the third quarter.

One minute later, Toco Creek struck again after recovering a fumble on the Keystone 10. Killmer followed up with his second rushing touchdown from 10 yards out. Medina's PAT gave the Toros a 28-0 lead with nine minutes remaining in the third quarter.

On Keystone's ensuing possession, Toco Creek's Camron Bolden intercepted a pass, setting up the Toros' final TD with six minutes left in the game. Dean hit paydirt with a 3-yard plunge, giving the home team a 35-0 lead after Medina's PAT and initiating a running clock under Florida high school football rules.

The Indians threatened one last time, with the defense stiffening during an 11-play, 45-yard drive by the Toros, stopping them on fourth down at the Keystone 24.

Schenck and Kyle Perkins led the team in tackles with eight each. Wyatt Van Zant had seven stops, while Andrew Lowery II recorded five tackles. Noah Branch and Colton Hollingsworth had four stops each.

Carson Eatmon punted four times for 106 yards, averaging of 26.5 yards per attempt.

Dickinson said that with one game remaining, the Indians can set a positive tone for the off-season with a win.

"I told the kids, you've got to believe in each other and keep working hard," he said. "We need to win this game for our seniors and also for the underclassmen to go out with a victory, have a good off-season and get ready for next year."

P.K. Yonge (2-7) plays in Class 1S and is coming off a 51-7 loss to Trinity Catholic, the fourth-ranked team in 1S.





Pollard carried the ball for a 9-yard gain, setting up McKenzie's 2-yard touchdown run to put the Tornadoes up 27-7 with 4:34 to play in the third quarter. The PAT was no good.

Passes of 6 and 9 yards helped the Palatka offense drive to the Bradford 49. The Panthers got runs of 6 yards and 3 yards from Jamarie McKinnon and Ishmael Foster, respectively, to set up third-and-1. After Elijah Williams tackled McKinnon for no gain, the Panthers went for it on fourth down. McKinnon was gang tackled for a loss of a yard.

Bradford responded with an eight-play, 61-yard scoring drive

that consisted of almost nothing but Pollard runs. Pollard had runs of 21 and 14 yards to pick up first downs, while McKenzie had a 7-yard run to set up first down at the Palatka 19. The last three plays of the drive were runs of 4, 12 and 3 yards by Pollard, with the 3-yard run carrying him into the end zone at the 8:02 mark of the fourth quarter. McKenzie completed a pass to Clark on the two-point conversion to make the score 35-7.

The score ended a fantastic night for Pollard, a junior who carried the load after the season-ending injury to senior Manny Covey on Oct. 21.

"He got his and Manny's carries tonight," Rodgers said, adding, "Like I've told everybody else I've talked to, he's a number-one running back. No question in my mind. I knew that watching him back in the spring. We had two number-one running backs. Now, he gets to be the featured back."

Pollard said the injury to Covey is his motivation.

"I told (Covey) the rest of the season is for him," Pollard said.

A fumble with less than four minutes to play had the

Panthers starting a drive at the Bradford 35. A couple of pass plays and a 9-yard run helped set up first-and-goal at the 10. Bowen and Bernard Nichols made consecutive tackles for no gain, but McKinnon threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to La'kwain Wright on third down. Alvarez kicked the extra point to conclude the scoring with 37 seconds left.

Shortly afterward, the celebration began. The Tornadoes won what they hope is the first of multiple championships this season.

"You've got to get the first goal first," Rodgers said. "Now, we've checked that one off."

Pollard, with an eye toward the postseason, said, "We've got to keep going."

Until then, the fact that his team earned a district trophy will occupy Bowen's thoughts.

"I'm fixing to go home, take me a good shower and just think about this," Bowen said.

Bradford is attempting to become the seventh team in school history to put together an undefeated season and the first to do so in 32 years.

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Season ends for KHHS runners at Region 1-2A championships

The Keystone Heights High School boys cross country team and girls team member Olivia Griffin competed at the Oct. 28 Region 1-2A finals, with Tyler Griffin coming closest to qualifying for state.

To advance to state, a team had to place in the top eight. The top three individuals not on those teams earned the right to advance as well.

Tyler Griffin had the 13th-best time among individuals not on the top eight finishing teams, placing 54th overall in the 110-runner field with a time of 18:18. He improved upon last year's region-level performance by nine seconds.

Keystone placed 15th out of 16 in the boys team standings, with Bolles, South Walton, Bishop Kenny, West Florida, North Bay

Haven, Eastside, Episcopal and Suwannee earning state berths.

The same top eight teams finished in the top eight last season as well. Bolles and Bishop Kenny have combined for 11 state championships and state runner-up finishes the last 13 years.

Still, Keystone got personal-record times from each of its boys runners with the exception of Griffin. Two of those runners — Anthony Peak and Ryder Thomas — are eighth-graders.

Thomas ran a 59th-place time of 18:28, shaving 2:23 off his region time from last year. Shepherd Rozier and Peak ran times of 18:55 and 19:10, respectively, with Peak's time being 1:49 lower than what he ran at the region level in 2021.

Jaden Park finished with a time of 19:58, while Josiah Durrenberger and Liam Callahan had times of 20:46 and 22:45,

respectively.

The top three boys individuals not on one of the state-qualifying teams were Wolfson's Andrew Marelo (16:01, third overall), Florida High's Xander McLaughlin (16:38, 10th) and Wakulla's Henry Lewis (16:47, 12th).

In the 112-member girls race, eighth-grader Olivia Griffin placed 70th with a time of 22:52. She had the 19th-best score among individuals not on the following state-qualifying teams: Bolles, Bishop Kenny, Episcopal, North Bay Haven, South Walton, Wakulla, Toco Creek and Fernandina Beach.

The top three individuals not on those teams were Florida High's Niya Coleman (19:20, seventh), Wolfson's Addison Sharp (20:27, 24th) and West Florida's Jennifer Mims (20:31, 25th).

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
