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McFadden grew higher education in Bradford County

Editor's note: In light of the March 15 passing of Bernard "Bernie" McFadden, who was the first-ever Santa Fe College Andrews Center director, the Telegraph presents the following story, which was originally published May 18, 1995, prior to McFadden's retirement. It says something about the passion he had for education in that he spent the majority of the interview for this story talking about the Andrews Center and how it benefitted Bradford County.


He was lucky enough to be "in the right place at the right time."

After being witness to the growth of college opportunities in Starke, Bernard "Bernie" McFadden will retire as the coordinator of the Santa Fe College Andrews Center, effective at the end of July 1995.

He has had the good fortune of watching the center grow, thanks to the cooperation of many.

Guy Andrews and Eugene L. Matthews were leaders in "changing this community forever," McFadden said, adding that the success of the college mission in Starke was also due to the relationship between the Santa Fe and the community.

McFadden said the Bradford County School District, city and county governments, the business

community, the chamber of commerce, the local media and even the correctional system, which helps maintain the college grounds, have all been factors in the college's success.

"In addition, we have been able to maintain the traditional family atmosphere at Santa Fe Community

College at the Andrews Center because of our size and the dedication of our wonderful staff that has served the community so well over the years. SFCC trustees, administrators and faculty have all made a strong commitment to the success of this program."

That commitment has helped the Andrews Center become what it is today, McFadden said.

When he was appointed as the first full-time coordinator of the center on Jan. 17, 1978, it was known as the SFCC Starke Center and actually located in a small office in Bradford High School. Santa Fe had offered evening classes since 1966, but the establishment of the Starke Center was the start of remarkable growth, McFadden said. The college had 150 seats filled in 11 sections in the 1977 fall semester. In last year's fall semester (1994), 1,509 seats were filled in 71 sections.

The college's scholarship program is one of the major reasons for that growth, McFadden said.

In 1977, only two BHS graduates had scholarships to Santa Fe. After the Starke Center opened, eight BHS graduates received scholarships in the 1978 fall semester. Then, in the summer of 1979, the Rotary Club of Starke voted to establish the first major scholarship program for BHS graduates to attend Santa Fe.

Manhunt on for shooting suspect

LAKE BUTLER — Union County Sheriff's office has released the name of the victim killed in a triple shooting over the weekend while the manhunt for the suspect continues.

William H. Hope, 35, of Lake Butler was transported to an area hospital along with the other victims but died from his injuries.

Another victim remains hospitalized in serious but stable condition, and a third was treated and released.

The murder investigation continues as authorities search for 56-year-old Anthony Lydell George of Lake Butler, the shooting suspect.

According to the sheriff's office, units responded to calls of numerous shots fired on the west area of Southwest First Terrace in Lake Butler around 10 p.m. on March 19. There they found the three gunshot victims.

George reportedly fled the area on foot and has not been seen since Sunday around 3 a.m. UCSO recovered his vehicle that morning, and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement Crime Lab is processing the vehicle for evidence.

UCSO has obtained nationwide extradition warrants in search for the suspect with a bond set at \$1.5 million. They expect to file additional charges at the conclusion of the investigation.

"We are also working with the U.S. Marshal Service Fugitive Task Force Unit to expand our search nationwide in locating Anthony George. Our agency continues to pray for the all the victims involved in this crime," UCSO wrote in a social media post.

Starke takes step to raise water and sewer rates

STARKE — Starke city commissioners are set to raise water and sewer rates again, having passed the ordinance on first reading March 15.

City Manager Drew Mullins presented the plan earlier this year, following up on a prior water and sewer rate study requested by the commission.

Residential water rates are simplified under the proposal, changing the usage tiers, with the first tier now being 0-2,000 gallons of water for \$20.84 a month. This represents a small savings for those in this tier, according to Mullins. Every 1,000 gallons of additional usage will add \$6 more to the bill.

Residential sewer rates have likewise been simplified. Customers will be charged 1.5 times their water bill for wastewater service.

Commercial rates remain somewhat complicated since the size of the meter determines the monthly charge. This can range from \$21.71 a month for a 1-inch meter to \$454.69 for an 8-inch meters. Each tier represents an increase over the previous base charge. Then there is a variable consumption

charge based on gallons used, and each of these tiers is also increasing. There is a separate consumption charge for wastewater service. Overall, Mullins said it represents a 25% rate increase.

The ordinance eliminates the distinction between customers inside and outside the city limits. The latter was formerly charged more for these utilities.

Mullins proposal saves money for residents using 2,000 gallons of months or less, encouraging conservation. The combined water and sewer bill would be \$52.10 compared to the current charge of \$56.62.

Those using more would pay more. At 3,000 gallons the monthly combined charge increases from \$60.60 to \$67.10, and at 4,000 gallons the bill would increase from \$64.58 to \$82.10.

After examining one month's bills, the manager's office found that most water and wastewater residential and commercial customers consumed no more than 3,000 gallons per month. The majority are under 2,000 gallons.

A few months ago, Mullins pointed out that Starke is in the middle of the back when its water rates were

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Bradford County moving forward with redistricting

STARKE — Bradford County is moving ahead with redistricting as soon as possible at the urging of a local law student.

The county gave up trying to address redistricting during the current election cycle, although the plan was to take a more thorough look in preparation for action before the 2024 cycle.

Commissioner Carolyn Spooner had previously urged the commission to move forward as it is responsible for maintaining a majority of minority citizens in at least one district to help ensure diverse representation. A plan presented by the elections office did that by moving a few lines between Districts 1 and 3, but the plan did not address the population disparity among districts.

Law student Colson Douglas pointed this out in his remarks to the commission on March 17. Preserving the constitutional protection of one person, one

vote means drawing districts so populations are as nearly equal as practicable, generally within a 10% range.

“Currently, Bradford County’s districts are outside of that range. The smallest district is District 1 and the largest is District 3, and that population deviation is 55.86%. So, we are currently not in compliance with federal law, and we have opened the county up to a lawsuit, either federal or state,” Douglas said.

One reason given for postponing redistricting was that Florida law restricts county redistricting to odd-numbered years. Douglas said that federal law takes precedent, and complying with federal law requires proceeding now.

Douglas’ research went back to the county’s last redistricting — 2012, an even-numbered year.

“The current districts were enacted in 2012, an even-numbered year, and we had the same county attorney as we do today. So, I don’t see why we’re using the odd-numbered

year provision as a shield to doing what is constitutionally required,” he said pointing to court and attorney general opinions to prove his point.

Using the same online program the city of Starke used to draw its proposed district lines, Douglas presented his own maps for commissioners to review.

“(The maps) exclude prisoners, keeping commissioners in their current districts, improve minority representation above the 50% threshold, and keep the population of all districts within 3% of each other, well below that 10% federal requirement,” Douglas said.

He received very positive feedback from the board for his efforts. Commissioners agreed to move forward, and attorney Will Sexton confirmed that election officials will be at the board’s April 4 meeting to go over the map drawing software, which would allow them to manipulate the proposed maps or draw new maps.

City, county elections will coincide

STARKE — Starke has synchronized its election dates with county elections.

The final vote occurred March 15 and will allow Supervisor of Elections Amanda Seyfang to run both elections simultaneously.

The Starke election would take place Tuesday, Aug. 23, at the same time as the state and county primary election. In the event of a runoff, Starke’s runoff election would be on state and county Election Day, Nov. 8.

Qualifying week for state, county and city offices would be June 13–17. Early voting dates would be Aug. 8–21 for the primary and Oct. 24–Nov. 6 for Election Day. Voter registration books close on July 25 for the

primary and Oct. 11 for the general election.

The vote was 3-1 with Commissioner Danny Nugent objecting.

Nugent’s seat in District 1 is up for election this year along with Districts 3 and 5, currently held by commissioners Shannon Smith and Wilbur Waters. (Smith was absent from the vote, but voted in favor on first reading.)

The county election includes county commission Seats 2 and 4, held by commissioners Kenny Thompson and Danny Riddick, and school board seats 1, 2 and 5, held by school board members Sheila Cummings, Gayle Nicula and Erica Reddish.

County Judge Tatum Davis’ bench is also up for election.

The Starke ballot could contain charter amendment

changes for voters to consider, while the Bradford County ballot could contain a referendum on electrical franchise fees.

Judge Davis and other incumbents have already turned in paperwork to run for reelection, including school board members Nicula and Reddish.

Reddish has competition in the nonpartisan race from challenger Lynn Melvin, who has announced her run in District 5.

Only challengers have announced so far in the county commission election. Mark Williams of Starke is running for the commission seat in District 2 as a Republican, while District 4 currently has a three-way Republican race between Tom Germano and Christiann Hudson of Keystone Heights, and Michael Monaghan of Hampton.

Starke adds position for community development director

STARKE — Starke City Manager Drew Mullins intends to hire a community services director, a new position approved by the city commission March 15.

Akin to the utilities director position that oversees utilities and operations, the community service director would oversee those functions of the city involving contact with the public.

According to the job description shared with commissioners, the position will be highly visible, providing leadership for the Planning and Community Development Department and employees

responsible for community growth management. This includes the city’s comprehensive plan, land use and zoning ordinances, development project review, housing and community development activities, code enforcement, and city parks and recreation.

In addition to significant engagement with the citizens and neighborhood groups, this director will work with elected officials and other government entities on areas like strategic planning. The goal is to establish goals and plan for growth management, preserving community character and involving the public in the planning process.

Aligning the city’s planning

and zoning regulations with that vision and streamlining the plan review and permitting process are among the director’s responsibilities. The position encompasses communications as well, from promoting public events to involving the public in planning and policy proposals.

The city is requiring a bachelor’s degree, completion of code enforcement certification, at least one year of experience in public service, and experience in planning, zoning or code enforcement.

Mullins said funding for the position was in the budget thanks to a recent retirement as well as other cost savings.

ranked against other nearby municipalities, with Green Cove Springs being on the low end at \$14.22 for 3,000 gallons and Hampton on the high end at \$39.02.

Consulting with the city’s engineers and accountant, Mullins found the city needs \$480,000 a year to cover debt from the sewer plant upgrade, \$300,000 for annual maintenance and infrastructure, \$250,000 a year to make up for revenue shortfall, and \$150,000 a year to transfer from water and sewer into the general fund to cover general government costs. According to the city manager, this would raise more than \$1.17 million in additional revenue.

Commissioner Danny Nugent was the only commissioner to vote against the ordinance,

which was approved 3-1 on first reading. (Commissioner Shannon Smith was absent.) Nugent’s previously objected to placing the burden of paying for wastewater plant upgrades on customers, preferring to find budget cuts that could pay off the debt.

At the time, Commissioner Scott Roberts said the city has been behind in collecting revenue to support its utilities, whether it be vehicle and equipment purchases or infrastructure repair.

“How do you address a deficit without affecting rates?” Roberts asked.

Roberts said the proposal benefits the low-income and low-

consumption customers.

Commissioner Shannon Smith agreed they are incentivizing conservation while improving the city’s economic position.

“We cannot keep operating in the red. It’s not fair to the citizens,” Smith said.

Utilities Director Scott Anaheim said there are no projected projects in place, because there is no funding for them. The rate increases are designed to allow the city to set aside money so he can implement his five-year capital improvements plan. This affects other departments’ plans as well. The city cannot proceed with street work if it doesn’t have money to take care of the utilities at the same time.

Costs will compound over time, Mullins said, as will concerns for public safety.

“So that’s the need for this. That’s the push for new rates. That’s the push for running it like a business,” he said.

Mullins elaborated on that on March 15 when Nugent asked about future rate increases, saying a good business anticipates increased costs of 3%-5% annually based on inflation, increased labor costs, etc.

The rate increase will be effective upon approval at the second reading.

In the Showmanship Awards, Addyson Kelley placed first in the Intermediate Class, with Charley Box placing in second. 
Zach Bartenslager served as Swine Show judge, Daniel Jerrels as auctioneer and Benji Bennett as announcer.

For this reason, the 4-H youngsters, known as Clover Buds, also compete with their record books. Cloverbud Record Book awards went to Lane Hartley, Wayne Hartley, Brycen Seay, Braxton Johnson, Sawyer Dyal, Ryder Akins, Madison Parker, Paxton

Graham and Jackson Brewster.

The smallest animals shown, also often serving as "starter" animals, are the rabbits and poultry, and these animals are also judged. The winners in these areas were: Grand Champion Poultry - Farrah Elixson, Reserve Grand Champion Poultry - Jamie-Lynn Courson, Grand Champion Rabbit - Clairabelle Martin and Reserve Grand Champion Rabbit - Dallas Williams. Both types of animal were kept caged and judged individually by Danny Padgett, preventing a mass panic and exodus of furry and feathered animals.

The Board of Directors of UCLA were pleased with the show as it went, with a total of 117 exhibitors (including all events), including 20 goats.

Goats, rabbits and poultry are not auctioned for slaughter in the last day of the event, so they did not make up part of the total of 80 animals sold on March 19.

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

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Retired CIA station chief dies in KH

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — A former Moscow station chief for the Central Intelligence Agency died in Keystone Heights in January after retiring to the Lake Region in 2018.

Murat Natirboff, 100, also served as a CIA agent in Africa, Asia and Europe. He retired in 1989 and moved to the Lake Region in 2018.

Natirboff was born in the Crimean Peninsula. He grew up in New York and served in the Marine Corps during World War II.

During 1986 he served as the CIA station chief in Moscow and was linked to the arrest of U.S. News correspondent Nicholas Daniloff.

The American Journalist was

arrested on Sept. 2 for espionage. The Soviets later claimed Natirboff instructed Daniloff to establish a relationship with a

Soviet citizen who later handed over classified information to the Americans.

Natirboff ended his official role as counselor of regional affairs at the U.S. Embassy and left the Soviet Union prior to Daniloff's arrest.

Daniloff was allowed to leave the Soviet Union after pleading no contest to the charges.

Some sources also claim that while serving as Cairo station chief during the 1970s, Natirboff helped organize Mujaheddin resistance to the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan.

Natirboff's son, Daniel Natirboff told the Washington Post that his father died on Jan. 10 from metabolic encephalopathy.

The Guy Andrews Minority Recruiting Committee was established in October 1986 to recruit and assist deserving minority students. The committee raises funds for four to five scholarships each year and is currently in the midst of a \$200,000 campaign to set up a permanent endowment.

In 1987, the Junior Woman's Club established a scholarship program enabling the Strawberry Queen and runners-up to attend Santa Fe.

Other annual scholarships have been established by American Legion Post 56, Med and Patricia Connelly, First Union Bank and the Woman's Club of Starke.

McFadden estimates that over the years, approximately 500 BHS seniors have received scholarships totaling more than \$700,000.

Another major stimulus for Santa Fe's growth in Starke has to be the "miracle on Call Street," McFadden said. Under the leadership of Guy Andrews, and with the support of the entire political and business community as well as hundreds of individuals, more than \$2 million was raised to renovate the old Bradford County courthouse for a new Santa Fe Starke Center. McFadden said the new center, which opened Aug. 15, 1985, had an immediate impact on enrollment.

In the fall semester of 1984, 206 seats in 11 sections were filled. In the first fall semester at the new center, 629 seats in 29 sections were filled, exceeding the 400 seats college officials hoped to fill, McFadden said.

The Starke Center's name was changed to the Andrews Center on Jan. 21, 1989, by the Santa Fe Endowment Corporation Board of Trustees. It was named after Guy Andrews — the first major Santa Fe College building to be named after a private donor, McFadden said.

McFadden considered it lucky to be able to share Andrews' vision. He said Andrews was always working on a project others thought impossible.

"Guy saw opportunities where others saw problems," McFadden said. "He was a dreamer, who showed us that dreams really do come true."

"I have been happy to be a small part of that dream that has brought the possibility of a college education to many people in this area who never would have had such an opportunity."

The college experienced a 29-percent increase in enrollment when the Andrews Center expanded into the renovated Jones-Rosenberg

building on Aug. 26, 1991, McFadden said. This project was once again led by Andrews, providing additional classrooms, an auditorium and space for the Eugene L. Matthews Bradford County Historical Museum.

The Andrews Center has experienced growth in ways other than enrollment, McFadden said. In response to community requests, new classes were added to the college's program in several areas, such as nursing assistants, displaced homemakers, EMTs, zoning seminar and land-use management.

Also, frequent seminars of the Santa Fe Institute of Government have provided information to correctional officers and upgraded secretarial skills of local government employees, McFadden said.

In 1987, Bradford County residents again showed their support by donating \$25,747 to the "Send a Book to College" project. Supplemented by funds of \$10,000 from the state's Academic Trust Fund, the project provides a minimum of \$1,500 yearly to ensure an outstanding collection of books and resources for the college.

The college completed an agreement with the Bradford County Public Library in May 1987 to provide special services to faculty and students in Starke, with Santa Fe providing \$12,000 per year for resource materials and support services, McFadden said. In return, the library is open a second evening each week and offers students such services as reference help, interlibrary loans, reserving books and accessing the Santa Fe library in Gainesville.

McFadden worked at several colleges before becoming the Andrews Center coordinator.

He was a chaplain at Florida A&M University, Florida State University, the University of Florida and the University of South Florida. Afterward, he was vice president at Bishop Moore High School in Orlando and

Tampa Catholic High School. McFadden served a year as a humanities professor at UF before becoming chairman of humanities at Edward Waters College in Jacksonville.

In 1972, McFadden joined the staff at Santa Fe as a professor in humanities, English and religion. McFadden was born in Sharon, Pennsylvania. He received a bachelor's degree in philosophy and a degree in theology at Josephinum College in Worthington, Ohio.

In 1956, McFadden came to Florida and received a master's degree in English literature at FSU in 1960. He received a doctorate in humanities at the University of Rome in 1963.

McFadden is married to Georgia Jaynes, and they are about to celebrate "a happy silver anniversary." They have four children: Tim, Kim, Scott and Dan.

This summer also marks the 20th anniversary of the family's sponsorship of a Vietnamese family.

Upon retirement, McFadden said he plans to carry out a promise he made to his wife.

"I promised my wife, who is a fitness expert, that my job for the first six months is to get in better physical shape," he said.

He also plans to try to do some writing. After a year of retirement, he hopes to return to the college as a part-time teacher. During his time as Andrews Center coordinator, he taught at least one class per term.

It has just now hit McFadden emotionally that he really is retiring. He'll certainly miss being the Andrews Center coordinator.

"This job has been a blessing to me because of the wonderful attitude of the people of Bradford County, who have shown their appreciation of the opportunity to have their own college campus by supporting the college in so many ways," McFadden said.

Museum highlights work of chaplains

CAMP BLANDING — A new exhibit at the Camp Blanding Museum highlights the work of military chaplains during World War II.

The exhibit said chaplains received the same training infantryman received, with the exception of marksmanship.

It also said chaplains could perform the religious rites of faiths not their own.

"Not only going above and beyond their duties," the exhibit said, "often times they pitched in to help medical personnel with the wounded and provided comfort when there was nothing more medical staff could do."

Nearly 9,000 chaplains served in the Army during World War II, with 124 killed in action. During Camp Blanding's active period, 24 chapels were located within the facility.

The Army established a chaplain school in 1917. To qualify, males between the ages of 23 and 34 must have been ordained by a recognized

denomination, attended college for four years and theological school for three. Three years of ministerial experience was also preferred.

Chaplains were classified as non-combatants by the Geneva Convention and did not carry or use weapons. They also wore special markings on their uniforms to identify them as non-combatants.

The exhibit highlighted the

story of the Four Chaplains. In February 1943, the four men: George L. Fox, Alexander D. Goode, Clark V. Poling and John P. Washington gave away their life jackets to other soldiers after their ship was hit by a torpedo.

"They then linked their arms together," the exhibit said, "saying prayers and singing hymns, went down with the ship."

One of the chaplain mannequins on display with the exhibit is wearing the uniform of the 82nd Airborne.

The museum said the uniform represents Chaplain Ignatius Maternowski, a Franciscan priest, who enlisted in the U.S. Army in July 1942.

He was the only chaplain killed on D-Day. He was the first Polish American priest to give his life in service to the U.S. in World War II.

Maternowski was killed by a sniper after crossing enemy lines to negotiate with Germans about establishing an aid station for medics.

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

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

in earnest, Weldon prayed, thanking God for using her and expressing the desire that others will allow God to use them to encourage and to help others who are going through hard times.

"I ask that every word that I share tonight, Lord, will not just inspire people to support us financially," Weldon said, "but will inspire people to be somebody's person, to be somebody's hope, because what would happen if we all did that in this room? We can literally change our entire surrounding communities."

Opening herself up

Weldon admitted she wasn't happy when God revealed to her what she should talk about at the banquet. He wanted her to share entries from her journal.

Yet Weldon knows that God knows best. Her response was: "I'm going to be obedient in that and trust that you will honor these words, knowing that it's not easy to take the mask off and to share these thoughts and words."

She shared her journal entry from May 3, 2019. She wrote about how God led her to

transport a woman to her mental-health treatments. The woman is a drug addict and believes she is possessed by a demon.

"In my flesh, I'm afraid of what's in her and around her," Weldon said she wrote. "As we were driving home from her mental-health appointment, I glance in my backseat, and she has pulled out a switchblade."

"In some ways, I feel like a failure because I was so scared when I looked back and saw her with that knife with this crazy look in her eyes. I am talking about a fear I never knew existed. I knew you were with us, but I was still scared, Lord."

Weldon confessed to God she was experiencing such a mixture of emotions and a confusion in regard to what she should do and what she should pray for, but she knew the answer was to keep worshipping God and doing what she could to help those in need.

"This walk isn't easy," Weldon said, "but that girl I was talking about, she was so worth it. She is somebody's mom. She's somebody's daughter. Sister. Friend."

Weldon said the people she and her Answers colleagues meet every day don't get to choose the homes they grew up in. Some of those homes are an extension of generations of addiction, sexual abuse or

mental-health issues.

In contrast, Weldon said she and so many others are privileged in life.

"I'm so thankful, and I won't apologize for that," Weldon said. "I'm thankful, but what do we do with the privilege?"

Perhaps using that privilege in life can help a man who's at his lowest point find hope and enjoy living again. Weldon talked about such a man — a man who had lost his family and then, being overcome by his grief, set fire to his house and sat in its midst, hoping he'd burn with it.

He was rescued, but he was a man with nothing. As Weldon put it, he was "untethered and grief-stricken."

"He showed up at Answers," she said. "He was the most broken man I've ever seen."

Weldon had no idea how Answers could help him. She admitted as much to the man and asked him if he'd join her in praying for a miracle. Two days later, he called Weldon, crying, and said, "Miss JoAnna. I'm so thankful for everything you all have done for me, but you need to let me go. It's not worth it. It's too much work to help me. It's over. I want to say goodbye."

She prayed to God that He would save this man and not let him take his own life. God then showed her the answer, which was to call Operation Barnabas,

an organization that provides help to veterans and first responders. Though this man didn't fall in either category, when Weldon called Operation Barnabas founder/CEO Trey Fagan, Fagan told her he was on his way to visit with the man in question.

"They have the same heart (as Answers)," Weldon said of Operation Barnabas. "They don't give up, and they don't say no."

The man now has his life turned around. He got his commercial driving license and is working, leaving his broken life behind him.

"This man is a complete miracle-success story," Weldon said.

Having a greater dependence on God

Weldon shared another entry from her journal dated Dec. 4, 2020: "It's not often — and if you know me, you know that this is true — that I'm at a complete loss for words, but here I am, trying to put into words what I'm experiencing right now. There's a baby sleeping in a Pack 'n Play in Hudson's room. This is a child we may have for only this weekend, maybe a few weeks or months, or forever. How in the world does the heart and mind take that in?"

"God, you so very clearly instructed our family to offer to take Carmine into our home. The peace attached to that decision has been so evident."

Weldon talked about how she and her family took a child into

their home and how she fretted about the possibility of her family eventually experiencing pain and loss if Carmine is reunited with his biological family. She and her family have fallen in love with Carmine, but Weldon said she and her family also know that God's best plan is for Carmine to return to his parents if they complete successful rehabilitation and become healthy enough to care for him.

"We've lived in this state that that very well could happen, and it very well may be the best thing for him," Weldon said.

A friend of Weldon's reminded her of Jesus' prayer in the garden of Gethsemane and how He followed through on his path to the cross, crucifixion, death and resurrection. Weldon was also reminded of a saying by one of her favorite speakers, Jill Briscoe, who said, "Courage is doing it scared."

Then there's the fact that "Carmine" means "garden of God" in Hebrew.

It all reassured Weldon that it's OK to be afraid as long as one remains obedient to God.

"My dependency on God reached a level I didn't understand was even possible," Weldon said.

Weldon concluded her remarks by inviting others to join her in singing songs of praise, with Eli Olivera singing and performing on an acoustic guitar. The first song Olivera performed was Elevation Worship's "Here Again," which includes the following lyrics: "I'm not enough unless you come. Will you meet me here again? 'Cause all I want is all you are."

"We're going to worship tonight," Weldon said. "If you're not comfortable with that, I totally get that. It might be uncomfortable, but you don't have to get up. You can sit. You can enjoy. You can pretend we're having a concert, but if you want to worship, I'm inviting you to walk down. This is the altar tonight, and Jesus said, 'Come to the altar,' because at the altar is the presence of God."

"I need it. I want more. There's never going to be enough for me anymore."
